California Voter Survey: Independent Health Care Cost Commission May 25, 2018

Methodology

David Binder Research conducted a survey of 800 likely November 2018 voters from May 17th through May 22nd, 2018. Half of the interviews were conducted online and half by telephone. For telephone interviews, 51% were conducted by landline and 49% by cell phone. Interviews were conducted in English or Spanish, depending on respondent preference. The margin of error for the survey is +/- 3.5%.

Topline Findings

Two in three California voters support an independent cost commission to review and approve the prices hospitals, doctors, and other providers of health care can charge.

Sixty-eight percent of voters support an independent cost commission, including 41% who strongly support this idea. Twenty-seven percent are opposed. Strong majorities of Democrats (84%) and independents (68%) support the proposal, as do 40% of Republicans.

Strong majorities support state government action to bring down health care prices, and support putting limits on what health care providers can charge.

Over three in four voters (78%) support the California state government taking action to reduce health care costs in the state.

Seventy-two percent agree that the government should act as a check on health care providers to get costs under control. Two in three say the government should step in and put limits on prices, including 84% of Democrats, 68% of independents and 39% of Republicans.
