

## Votes to Repeal Health Care in CA-48 REPRESENTATIVE DANA ROHRBACHER

In 2017, Congressman Dana Rohrabacher took major votes to cut, cap, and otherwise undermine the health care of his own constituents. Urge him to stand with California consumers and against the still-pending proposals that continue to put our patient protections at risk.

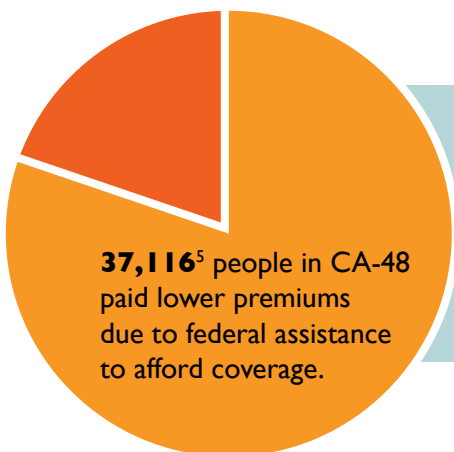

### With AHCA & House Budget Votes, Coverage At Risk

Though not passed in the Senate, the AHCA and House budget bill, both supported by Rep. Rohrabacher, would have led to an estimated **94,675<sup>3</sup>** fewer people with health care coverage in CA-48.



### Covered California



These 37,116 people in CA-48 got **\$112 million<sup>6</sup>** in federal funding to reduce the cost of care, which would have been eliminated under the AHCA and House budget bill supported by Rep. Rohrabacher. That's less money to area doctors, hospitals, providers and health plans which would have resulted in service cuts and additional premium increases.

**43,664<sup>4</sup>** people in CA-48 bought coverage through Covered California in 2016, the state's marketplace for individual insurance set up under the ACA.

## Medicaid (Medi-Cal)

The AHCA and the House budget bill would have cut Medicaid by over 25%<sup>7</sup> by rolling back the Medicaid expansion, and instituting per capita caps. In **CA-48, 23%**<sup>8</sup> of residents are on Medi-Cal.

An estimated **57,559**<sup>9</sup> people in CA-48 gained coverage through Medicaid expansion and would have lost coverage in 2020 under the AHCA.



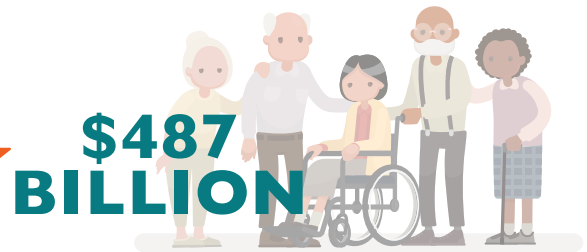
UC Irvine Medical Center had more than **614,000** Medi-Cal inpatient and outpatient visits in 2016 and stood to **lose \$67 million** in annual revenue<sup>11</sup>.



**166,817**<sup>10</sup> people in CA-48 are on Medi-Cal, and would have been impacted by the proposed cuts.

## Medicare

The House budget bill would have cut the Medicare program, helping seniors and people with disabilities, by **\$487 billion**<sup>12</sup> nationally.

## Jobs & GDP

In Orange County<sup>13</sup>, **15,000 jobs** and **\$1.4 billion** in GDP would have been lost due to the vote on the AHCA.
